different digital behaviors and preferences Therefore companies must know them and their work preferences to fill the workforce shortage gap Remote working as a sub trend of the mega trend New Work has become the new standard for workers especially since the pandemic However there aren t any specific regulations regarding remote work in Germany yet In general remote work provides workers e g more freedom and a better work life balance Nevertheless remote work also has the downside such as workers experiencing isolation and loneliness due to the lack of social contact with co workers less productivity outside of the office etc For companies offering remote work gives them complete access to the talent pools including freelancers as external workers reducing costs due to fewer offices being more attractive to job seekers But on the other side remote leadership has become a big challenge for leaders Furthermore companies have to deal more with cyber security When everything s going remotely companies have become an easier target of cyber attacks
